

The Barossa and wider Region stretches from the shores of Gulf St Vincent 80 km east to include the watershed of the Mount Lofty Ranges. From south to north, the region extends from the boundaries of Northern Adelaide, through the central Mount Lofty Ranges, a distance of 65 km, encircling the best broad acre cropping and wine growing country in South Australia.

A coast line with low-lying saltbush and samphire marsh lands is a part of a globally significant, high ecological and biodiversity value, **Adelaide International Bird Sanctuary**, and forms the western boundary of the region.

Traditional grain growing and food producing regions can be found in the north of the region. The production of premium quality grains and pulses over last 100 years continues to this day, supported by innovation and value adding.

The Barossa is Australia's foremost premium wine and food production region. Well known for producing some of the world's best wines, the wider region, incorporating

Light, Gawler and Adelaide Plains, also produces quality grains, pulses and vegetables. Its **Mediterranean-like climate** and its beautiful, historic amenities attract tourists from around the world.

The 'Barossa Brand' is highly sought after due to its high profile. Businesses operating from the Barossa gain an immediate advantage. Consumers associate the Barossa with high quality, safe, premium products.

The region is close to local, national and international markets. The **Northern Expressway** links the region with the **Adelaide Airport, Edinburgh Airforce base and Port Adelaide**, and provides quick road freight access to the Eastern and Western States.

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



Industry Profile - Wine

The Barossa as a world class region of fine wine endeavour based on a unique story of generations, inheritance and hallowed ground. The Barossa is home to some of the oldest *Shiraz, Grenache, Cabernet Sauvignon* and *Semillon* vineyards in the world, supplemented by new exploratory styles.

SA produces more than **75%** of Australia's premium wines. The Barossa on average accounts for **8%** of volume and **27%** of the total value of the South Australia grape and wine sector contributing on average **\$740** million annually.

The Barossa's **13,626** hectares of vineyards produce on average **80,000** tonnes of grapes with an estimated value of more than **\$114** million per annum. Up to **600,000** tonnes of wine grapes are processed annually in the Barossa. **2,700** people employed in the wine and grape sector in the Barossa accounting for **9.32%** of national wine sector employees.

Since **2001** exports of Barossa wine have grown from **402,000** cases to over one million cases equivalent annually and in dollar terms from **\$39** million to over **\$154.5** million (Mar, 2018). Wine export is growing in value more quickly than volume with highest growth in top 3 price categories.





Industry Profile - Food

South Australia is home to a renowned agriculture, food and wine industry. The Region takes pride in producing some of the best premium food and wine in the world — produced sustainably in a clean and safe environment. The Greater Barossa region has a rich and flavourful food culture that has a culinary heritage linked to German and English settlement in the **1840's**. More than **50** artisan food producers, more than 80 cafes and restaurants offering artisan food prepared with care and passion telling a story of time-honoured recipes passed down through six generations.

The total land area within the Region is **310,300** ha with agricultural land comprising of **268,323** ha.

South Australia's total agricultural gross value production is valued at \$5,366,480,100 of which the Barossa Regions contribution is 7.2%. Three major contributors to the Region's agricultural output are broadacre cropping, livestock and fruit production.

There is a diverse range of agriculture production within the Region. Number of farms: **110** pig, **130** chicken, **1104** sheep, **864** cattle, **172** alpaca, **19** deer, **101** oilseeds, **550** grapes, **78** fruit.

Industry Profile - Tourism

The Barossa is SA's food and wine tourism flagship well supported by trails for cycling, walking and riding. Colonial heritage and culinary traditions inspired by early settlers are alive and well, and modern reinventions have sparked interest in cultural food experiences including cooking schools, artisan products, farmers markets and restaurants.




